
## It's Never Over til It's Over

We were seeing some "Light at the End of the Tunnel" regarding the easing of the COVID-19 virus impacts. Unfortunately, it's "Not Over" yet, as we must continue to be cognizant of this deadly virus. I am a true believer in science as so many viruses and diseases are addressed by



Another item that is **"Not Over"** is GCU's continued financial success! Assets have grown by \$104.8 million or 4.8% from year end 2020 and stand at \$2.306 billion. Surplus also reflects a \$9.6 million or 5.3% increase from year end 2020 totaling \$192.3 million through June 30, 2021. The largest

contributing factor to surplus is net income as \$14.1 million has been realized through June 30, 2021. This has well exceeded budget thus far. Our solvency ratio by Total Adjusted Capital continues to increase as well and is at 109.9%, one of the highest in comparison to other carriers. We are in the process of finalizing our 2021 quarterly statement.

Our Chief Financial Officer Tim Demetres will be presenting our second quarter 2021 financial results with detailed commentary in the October issue of the *GCU Magazine*. Our sincere thank you to our members and agents for the continued trust that you have placed within our Society that allows for continued financial stability!

Despite the challenges associated with the COVID-19 pandemic, we are so grateful to the officers and members of our lodges and districts for the activities that were held in support of the GCU's Mission

# Sisters of St. Basil to Celebrate 87<sup>th</sup> Annual Pilgrimage

The Sisters of St. Basil the Great are pleased to announce that on Sunday, September 5, 2021, the 87<sup>th</sup> Annual Pilgrimage in honor of Our Lady of Perpetual Help will be held at Mount St. Macrina in Uniontown, PA. With the theme, "Mother of Perpetual Help, Our Gentle Protectress," the Pilgrimage will be an in-person event and also live streamed. Weather permitting, liturgical services will be broadcast at www.sistersofstbasil.org.

Out of an abundance of caution, and in consultation with local county CDC/health department officials, this year's Pilgrimage will have the following guidelines and limitations:

All liturgical services will take place at the Shrine Altar. Due to the inability to accommodate large numbers indoors, the potential for postponement or cancellation of a liturgical service exists with the presence of severe weather conditions.

Boxed lunches/snacks will be available for purchase during this year's Pilgrimage. Pilgrims wishing to enjoy a warm meal are encouraged to support the local restaurants on Route 40 directly across from the Mount.

Please see the list of local motels and hotels on the Sisters' website if you wish overnight accommodations. There will be no overnight accommodations on the grounds of Mt. St. Macrina this year, which includes campers. A limited number of self-contained RVs are permitted by appointment only (contact Sr. Carol at 724-438-7149).

Pilgrims will be asked to wear masks when entering indoor shrines, as well as buildings such as the Religious Gift Shop, House of Prayer, restroom facilities, etc.

Visitors to the Monastery (Motherhouse) will be limited this year to Sisters' family. There will be no shuttle service on the property.

The Sisters are very happy to welcome our beloved Pilgrims back to the grounds of Mt. St. Macrina this year. We encourage you to make the best, most prudent decision for yourself and your family members regarding traveling to Pilgrimage this year. ## **BLESSINGS**

hat does it mean when we bless something, or to say we are blessed? We are all familiar with many blessings – food, homes, various objects as crosses and medals, and even personal bless-

ings. What do these blessings mean? Is the blessing of a house or car an "extra insurance policy?" Is it safer than an "unblessed" house or car? This would be bordering on superstition.

To be blessed or to have an object blessed, we are presenting that person or thing to God so that by the power of the Holy Spirit, they would be set apart for God's purposes. For example, a cross on a chain or a bracelet is a piece of jewelry, but after it is blessed, it is set apart for a different purpose than just to decorate our bodies or clothing. It will still be worn like jewelry, but the purpose for which it is worn has changed, it will now point to Christ and his death and resurrection. Today blessings are done either by the sprinkling of holy water or by making the sign of the cross. Originally blessings were done by words and formulas. Blessing is a declaration that something is good or sacred or a gift of God. To bless then means to see things as they really are, as all coming from God and as a sign of His Presence among us.

One blessing we do many times is the blessing of ourselves by making the sign of the cross. It is one of the oldest gestures of our faith and is written about in the second century. Originally, the cross was made on the forehead with the hand or finger to keep away demons. In the fifth century, monks made the sign of the cross on the forehead, shoulders, and breast as a sign of our complete consecration to God. In the sixth century, it was given a Trinitarian interpretation against a heresy of the time. The three fingers represented the Trinity and the two fingers the two natures in Christ. This is how we still make the sign of the cross today in the Byzantine tradition.

In the month of August, we celebrate two great feast days in the Byzantine Church, The Feast of the Transfiguration of our Lord, and the Dormition or Falling Asleep of Mary, the Mother of God. Because the Feast of the Trans-

figuration occurs during the harvest season, in some places vineyards and grapes are blessed, and in others fresh fruits, to represent the "first-fruits" of the harvest. It is an expression of thanksgiving to God for his guiding hand during the growing season. The Feast of Transfiguration on August 6th is a fitting time to celebrate the manifestation of God's presence, and to give thanks for His presence in our lives. Fruit, the symbol of the good things of life, is blessed to become the sign of God's grace in life, and of His presence among us. This blessing is a sign of the final transfiguration of all things in Christ. It signifies the ultimate flowering and fruitfulness of all creation in God's Paradise, where all will be transformed by the glory of the Lord.

On August 15<sup>th</sup> we bring flowers to church from our gardens on the Feast of the Dormition of the Mother of God. Holy tradition tells us that all the Apostles, except for Saint Thomas, were transported mystically to Jerusalem to be with the Mother of God and to be present at her burial. When the Apostle Thomas arrived, the Apostles opened the tomb so that he could kiss her farewell. As the tomb was opened, the body of the Most Pure Virgin was missing, and the cave was filled with flowers and the sweet fragrance of Paradise.

To have an object or ourselves blessed is not superstitious but is another way God can touch our lives. It shows that all of us and all of God's Creation, is set apart for a higher purpose, and to acknowledge that all creation comes from God. It is a way to give thanks and honor the Creator of all things.

# Lessons in the Law

#### Can You Find the Money?

oday's electronic environment is a challenge to the people trying to determine what are the assets of their deceased spouse or parent.

In one instance, Carol, the wife, died, and Bill, the surviving spouse, could not find out what assets were in Carol's name. The bank froze the account on death and the husband did not know her passwords.

In another case, both parents were deceased, and the children could not access their financial statements, since everything was being sent electronically to the parents. The children did not have access to the computer files, because they did not have the passwords.

In both cases, estates had to be opened through pro-

bate court in order to obtain the necessary court orders to access the accounts. Extra time and financial costs were incurred to obtain this information.

What to do? Make sure your spouse, children, or designated person has access to where the assets are located and what your passwords or the accounts are or where they are kept. In my case, I have a safe and this information is in it. I have given the safe combination to my children so they could have access to this information.

There are ways to avoid probate for every asset you own. Make sure you have discussed the ways to avoid probate with your estate planning lawyer. If you do it incorrectly, your Will or Trust may not work the way you thought it would work.

Over 200 pairs of new and gently worn shoes were collected and sent to Soles4Souls.


Thanks to all who helped make this an overwhelming success. The parish is looking forward to next year with the hopes of sending more shoes to help these women succeed.

Barb and Bill were part of an eight-person crew, with officials from Districts 3 and 6, needed to officiate the Triple Jump. Members of the crew rotated through the positions of: Wind Gauge Operator, Flight Coordinator, Tape Puller, Recorder, Board Judge, Marker and Rakers (2). All of the officials helped checking-in and inspect the athletes and their spikes; tack down two runway tape measures, one for each jumping board and carefully placed two new boards at the appropriate distances with levels and shims. This is the sixth year for Bill and the third year for Barb, working the PA State Meet.

Barb and Bill are members of the Lawrence County Chapter of PIAA Track & Field (T&F) and Cross Country (CC) Officials. The Lawrence County Chapter serves the northern part of District 7, as well as the southern part of District 10. This year, the couple worked meets as far north in Pennsylvania as Meadville, Cochranton, Titusville and Jamestown, and as far south as Mohawk, Ellwood City and Seneca Valley. They also worked the 2019 PIAA Cross Country State Championships, as well as several NCAA Division II meets at Slippery Rock University, and T&F meets for the NCSAA (National Christian School Athletic Association) at Grove City and Geneva Colleges.

## GCU Student Debt Program Continues in 2021

The GCU Board of Directors realizes that many young members complete college with significant Student Debt and has approved continuation of the GCU Student Debt Program. The budget established will provide up to 100 awards in 2021. The program assists GCU members with a portion of their Student Debt. 



#### Rev. Thomas G. Schaefer

Reverend Father Thomas G. Schaefer of Pittsburgh, PA unexpectedly fell asleep in the Lord on July 3, 2021 while vacationing in California. He was born in Pittsburgh on July 7, 1951, the only child of the late Gerard & Josephine (Sobczak) Schaefer. Father Tom was the beloved cousin of the Golembiewski, Janosko, Sobczak, Zebracki, and Schaefer Families and a caring and special friend to many.

His early education was at St. Vincent dePaul Elementary School and St. Francis DeSales High School in McKees Rocks, PA. He attended St. Mary Seminary University in Baltimore, MD where he received a BA in Language and Literature in 1974. He spent 9 years in the Peace Corps in Central Africa, and attended the Major Seminary in Emile Biayenda, Congo in 1981 and 1982.

He received his first Masters Degree in teaching French and English as a second language at the School of International Training in Brattleboro, VT in 1981.

Father Thomas entered the Congregation of the Holy Ghost Fathers (Spiritans) in 1982 and on July 24, 1982, he was ordained a priest in the chapel at Duquesne University in Pittsburgh.

With further graduate studies at Duquesne, Father Thomas earned a Masters Degree in Liberal Studies in 1987; a Masters Degree in Formative Spirituality in 1989 and a Doctorate (PhD) in the Science of Human Formation in 1997.

During 1983 & 1984, his responsibilities at Duquesne University included

Campus Ministry, Vocations Office, and Director of the Spiritan Pre-Novitiate Program. From 1991 through 2001 he served as Dean in the Office of Domestic Admissions and International Affairs.

During this time Father Thomas was also named assistant priest at St. Anthony Church and pastor of St. Stanislaus Church in the Strip District of Pittsburgh.

Father Thomas left the Spiritan Fathers on March 1, 2001 and was received as a priest of the Byzantine Catholic Archeparchy of Pittsburgh. His pastorates included the parishes of Nativity of the Mother of God, Greenfield-Pittsburgh and St. Mary, Ambridge, PA. He then served as pastor at St. John the Baptist and St. John Chrysostom in Pittsburgh, until his death. He served on several committees and boards at Saints Cyril & Methodius Seminary.

In 2002, Father Thomas began a faithful and dedicated time of ministry to La Roche University in the North Hills of Pittsburgh. Among other contributions to programs of global interest and language, his offices included Associate Vice-President for Academic Affairs, Dean of Domestic Admissions and International Affairs and Director of External Relations, Pacem in Terris Institute.

Until his passing, he was contributing in various board member capacities to Sage Scholars, Philadelphia; Pittsburgh Regional Science Initiative; Holy Family Institute; Sister Thea Bowman Foundation and Hobson's Digital Media Inc.

A scholar and academician, Father Thomas held many professional memberships, and was the author of various publications. He loved people, music, learning, and everything international – especially African. He deeply appreciated the beauty of music and the arts. He was proficient in French, Spanish, Sango and Latin languages; had a working knowledge of Polish; and was currently studying Arabic and Hebrew.

There was a viewing for Father Thomas at the Chapel of the Sisters of Divine Providence on Wednesday, July 14, 2021 followed by a Roman Catholic Mass. A viewing then followed at his final pastoral assignment at St. John Chrysostom BC Church in Pittsburgh PA, where the funeral service for a priest was prayed.

His funeral Divine Liturgy was celebrated by Metropolitan Archbishop William C. Skurla on Friday, July 16 at the Cathedral of St. John the Baptist in Munhall, PA. Interment followed at St. Mary Cemetery, McKees Rocks.
